
Cop Writes About Unsolved Deaths (and adds a little conspiracy)

Erik Voss didn't plan on becoming a cop but a ride along with an officer when he was in high school swayed him as he had planned to become a history teacher. He's found a way to mesh his passion of the two – history and law enforcement – in a series of books he penned about unsolved deaths. "About 10

years ago, I stumbled across a newspaper article that mentioned a 1928 unsolved murder. I saw that the body had been stuffed in a culvert at Highway 67 and Town Hall Road (in the Town of Delavan.) I went to the library, got out the old microfiche, started researching," Voss said. Voss, a detective sergeant, is a 26-yr veteran of the Town of Delavan Police Dept. He said his research about the murder was mainly through two local newspapers circulated at the time – the Delavan Enterprise and the Delavan Republican. "It was a matter of going through them, week by week, and it wasn't always easy because sometimes it was on the front page but other times it was in a random spot," Voss said. The body of the young woman, estimated to be in her late teens to early 20s, was found Aug. 23, 1928 but it was believed to have been there for 6 weeks. Voss said the coroner determined the cause of death to be blunt force trauma. Adding to the drama surrounding her death, Voss said a Milwaukee family's daughter had been missing so another autopsy was done which believed the cause of death to be strangulation. "That started a war between the two pathologists. But ultimately, they agreed the body in Delavan was not of the missing woman from Milwaukee," Voss said.

'To be a voice' He said the more he researched, the angrier he felt. "It's such a lousy way to be treated. I mean, she was a person and came from a family. Somebody took her life and got away with it. I wanted to be a voice for her," Voss explained. Other than her estimated age, there were few details known but she had black hair, good teeth and was average to slender in size. She was never identified. "She was put in the culvert head first, wrapped in a blanket. A dog alerted a county worker who then found her. There was no evidence at the scene," Voss said. He said after her body was found, a father and son came forward and said on July 15 of that year, they had turned the corner from the north onto Town Hall Road and saw a Ford Coupe pulled over with a guy in it and a woman slumped over but they didn't stop. Voss said chemical analysis of the woman's blood only showed that she had black hair and wasn't poisoned, but the tests were very rudimentary at the time. His next stop after the library was to speak with Walworth County Coroner at the time, John Griebel. He said Griebel told him about the Walworth County Cemetery, which has the bodies of people who died between the 1870s and 1931 at the Walworth County Asylum and poor farm, and unknowns. "There are no headstones, only a plaque with the names of known people and at the bottom says, 'possibly other unknown persons.' It's kind of humbling, I guess, in the middle of nowhere and literally just looks like grass," Voss said.

Voss said deciding to write about a book – categorized as historical fiction and titled Murder Made Casual – was a way of honoring that young woman's life. "Who knows what potential she could have had? It didn't seem fair to me. I know she could've been an awful person but it's still not right that someone took her life and got away with it," he said. Voss said people in a Delavan subdivision had heard screaming that July and two people were taken into custody but let go. While investigators believed they knew where it happened and what happened no one was ever arrested. "It kept going through my mind, that she could've been killed by so many people so I took the real life details and wove it into the plot of an international conspiracy," Voss said. About nine years after finding the first article about the woman, Voss finished his first book.

The sequels Voss said while researching for his first book he came across other unsolved deaths in the Delavan area so followed up his first novel with the sequels Murder Made Necessary and Murder Made Political. "These books contained the unsolved murder details of other people that happened in 1930, and 1933 respectively," he said, adding that he also includes local landmarks in his books such as Penwern, Lake Lawn Resort and Village Supper Club. And for a continuation of characters, he wrote in two agents, Charlie Postlethwaite and Gretchen Retrum (both family names of Voss'), whose relationship evolves throughout the series. "As a detective, there's a lot behind the scenes that no one hears about so I tried to work some of that into the stories," Voss said. "They have to try and solve these deaths without getting killed but it's not doom and gloom. They're both kind of smart alecks and that's realistic because cops have to balance the bad somehow." The second book, Murder Made Necessary, is about a man in his 60s who drown in Delavan Lake. He had a family but they don't know why he ended up where he did and he wasn't suicidal. The third book, Murder Made Political, is about a man in his 30s whose body was found along the side of Highway 50. Voss said crimes of similar nature tend to happen in close spans of time. "We get different periods of it – deaths, arsons, burglaries, drownings. It's crazy. The Delavan Historical Society has a whole folder of Delavan Lake drownings. A lot of people have drowned in that lake," he said. He doesn't have another Murder book planned but said the third in the series wraps up nicely and there's an opening if he decides to do more.

MORE ABOUT THE FILM WE'D BE INVOLVED IN - FROM ERIK VOSS We envision a combo of cars parked and in action, simulating a typical 1928 day. I'm gonna guess the owners have 1920's era clothes? This is one of the settings of my novel Murder Made Casual and one of the interview scenes. Also, I've been inside several times, and it could be a real-life location for the game of Clue. The grassy area on the right is flat and where the vehicles would be parked, along with the extras gawking at the body. Some things never change. This would be a scene where the parking lot has a bunch of Model A's, people getting luggage out of their vehicles etc.

INFO ON PLANNED FILMING OF SCENES:

Here are photos of Lake Lawn Resort, the route to Cobblestone Rd. and then Cobblestone Rd where some of the cars could be parked for the dead body gawkers. I've highlighted where the cars would be in blue. Entering off Hwy 50, the road continues south through the golf course, past the clubhouse, then veering west following the road down to one of the lodge's parking lots. We would be filming coming down the main LLR driveway and there's parking lots on either side of the road so there'd be cars prominently displayed. We're also going to be filming in the Great Room, which actually served as the lobby in 1928 and we're going to need extras of all ages so if anyone's interested.

Apple-Walnut Bread Pudding Makes 8 servings Prep: 30 min. Bake: 50 min.

5 tablespoons butter, divided 2 medium Granny Smith apples, peeled & chopped 1 cup sugar, divided 1/2 teaspoon ground cinnamon 1/4 cup brandy or unsweetened apple juice

3 cups refrigerated unsweetened vanilla almond milk 4 large eggs, beaten 1/2 teaspoon vanilla extract 8 cups cubed day-old bread

You're Invited



Preheat oven to 350°. In a large cast-iron or other ovenproof skillet, melt 2 tablespoons butter over medium heat. Add apples and 1/4 cup sugar. Cook and stir until apples are golden brown and soft, about 6 minutes. Stir in cinnamon. Remove from heat. Stir in brandy; cook over medium heat until liquid is syrupy, 1-2 minutes. Remove from heat. In a large bowl, whisk milk, eggs, vanilla and remaining 3/4 cup sugar until blended. Gently stir in bread; let stand until bread is softened, about 5 minutes. Stir in apple mixture and walnuts. Add 1 tablespoon remaining butter to skillet; place in oven to heat skillet. Carefully remove hot skillet from oven once butter has melted. Add bread mixture. Melt remaining 2 tablespoon butter; drizzle over top. Bake until puffed, golden and a knife inserted in center comes out clean, 50-55 minutes. Serve warm.







FORD MODEL & ADVENTURES

As I prepare for the next chapter in front of me as I enter retirement, going to swap meets & shows, club meetings & events, traveling to different points of interest, on whatever day or time, I did not expect a "Curve in the Road" event that would be in front of me.

While waiting to schedule an oil change and tire rotation on our modern vehicle, we parked our modern car outside of the back garage next to a wooded area. A few days later I had to run an errand and had to drive it. The "trac off" and the "check engine" light was on. Searching the web, all the common suggestions on how to fix it did not work.



When I opened the hood to see if there was something obvious. I looked around the engine compartment I noticed the main wire harness was severely chewed up by some sort of critter. It was unbelievable. Whether the car was in the front or back driveway, this was the first time in 10 years. Fortunately, insurance will cover most of the repairs.

With the weather beginning to change, and critters looking for a new home, it might be a good time to start thinking how to prevent serious damage to our cars.

So as we all begin to put our Model A's away for the winter, I wondered what is the best anti-critter devices and methods you use and to share what suggestions I found off the internet.

Here is a list of methods use by a lot of people. Moth balls, peppermint oil, electronic gadgets, rodent tape, light, repellents (strong smells), cayenne pepper spray, rodent sprays, dryer sheets, Irish Spring soap, traps (both live and dead), charcoal, and park away from woods and grass areas.

Of course, it seems like these methods and repellents work real well for some and others not so much. Each situation depends on your environment your Model A is in.

We have been using dryer sheets inside and outside the car, moth balls & traps around the outside perimeter of our Model A. So far, this has worked for us.

PIETENPOL AIR CAMPERS - BRODHEAD AIRPORT, SATURDAY, JULY 22



The **Pietenpol Air Camper** is a simple parasol wing homebuilt aircraft designed by Bernard H. Pietenpol. The first prototype that became the Air Camper was built and flown by Pietenpol in 1928. The Air Camper was designed to be built of spruce and plywood. One of Pietenpol's goals was to create a plane that was affordable and easy to construct for home builders. Building an Air Camper requires basic woodworking skills and tools. Builders also need to fabricate some metal fittings to attach the wooden parts together. Some welding is required. The plans for the Pietenpol Aircamper were originally published in a four-part serial in the "Flying and Glider" Manual of 1932-33. The original model was flown using an Ace four cylinder water-cooled engine. The Model A Ford engine later became the standard powerplant used; the design was first flown with one in May 1929. *Wikipedia*
